When FDR Came to Call

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Today our politicians fly to important campaign stops but in 1938, the President traveled by train. He was making his way across the country on what he called a "look-see" trip and his journey took him across Nevada on the lines of the Southern Pacific Railroad. His stops along the way? Montello, Carlin, Imlay, and Sparks. Sounds exciting! Of course, these locations were chosen not because of their importance in politics but because they were where the train carrying the president could stop to be serviced. The length of the stop in Carlin was scheduled for a whole whopping 15 minutes! The President invited Nevada politicians, including the governor, to join him on the train as it crossed Nevada and they were offered the opportunity to speak to the crowds at the stops.

But, there was hope that the President would make an appearance. The train was not stopping in Elko so the Elko Daily Free Press reported that many from Elko would travel to Carlin to see if they could catch a glimpse of the President. But, apparently, someone was being difficult because the next day it was announced that the schedule would be changed and the President would in fact stop very briefly in Elko. But, in the end, the President did not stop in Elko but he did wave from the platform of the last car as it rolled slowly through Elko. The Elko Daily Free Press pointed out the moment as special because so many people had seen the man's face in print for so long but never in the flesh. More than 100 cars traveled from Elko to get a closer view. I wonder where they all parked?

So, what happened in Carlin? Not only did the train stop as planned but the President did in fact have something to say. He first greeted the crowd and then touched upon the lack of water being an obstacle to the growth of Nevada's population. He jokingly said that "Nevada's population is altogether too small" but that he wasn't referring to the children present. He then said that he needed to get back to work but he didn't leave the platform immediately because the Carlin band which had greeted him with a tune upon arrival began to play the nation's anthem for their President. He then thanked the band and returned to the work of running a country via telephone and radio which he commented was much easier to do than it had been previously thanks to the advance of technology.



The Elko Daily Free Press noted that "every precaution was taken to guard the president's special as it passed through Nevada." That all switches were manned by railroad crews and track walkers watched rails and bridges. Interestingly, it would be only a little over a year later when the infamous sabotage of the lines would cause the wreck of the City of San Francisco streamliner on the same tracks.
